MARCH FARM TASKS: SPRING LIVESTOCK TO-DOS

If you're a livestock farmer, you're probably pretty busy. Either there are plenty of babies running around the farm, or you're getting ready to welcome new animals. The young ones are more susceptible to problems, and parents need regular spring care, as well as monitoring for any issues that could occur after birth -not to mention mud season, choosing the right time to let animals on pasture, and dealing with the temperature shifts that occur this time of year.

There are quite a few resources from Extension programs to help newer farmers be aware of, and prepare for, what their livestock need. If you have questions around feeding your livestock, you should check out [this article from University of Oregon Extension](#) that encourages you to:

- Delay spring turnout
- Continue supplemental feeding
- Monitor body condition regularly
- Investigate causes of poor condition in livestock
- Increase feeding for energy during cold snaps

In addition, [an article from University of Missouri Extension](#) provides insight for cattle spring management, but there are many things here that can apply to all livestock. They encourage you to:

- Involve Your Veterinarian Early
- Optimize the Breeding Herd
- Prioritize Male Fertility
- Reduce Weaning Stress
- Update Spring Vaccinations
